GROUP OF THREE STONE AGE TOOLS

SPAIN- LOWER PALAEOOLITHIC PERIOD (600,000 years BC)

MATERIAL AND METHOD: set of three stone tools in a yellow colour. The flints are composed of a very hard siliceous sedimentary rock generally consisting of close to pure chalcedony and impurities such as oxides and quartz, which determine the colour. Flint is formed from seawater or in silica-saturated lakes as a result of eruptions from volcanoes. Due to its ability to split into sharp edges (known as conchoidal breaks), flint was used very early on by man for the manufacturing of tools. With percussion, rocks rich in iron or an iron tool can also produce the sparks required to make a fire.

Good state of preservation.

ORIGIN: the presence of hominids in Andalusia dates back to the Lower Palaeolithic period. The main settlement areas are located in the Upper Guadalquivir area and south of the Sierra Morena. Both of these areas were important communication routes for hunter-gatherers.

MEASUREMENTS: Length: 10 cm (3.9") to 12.5 cm (4.9")

WEIGHT: 1.2 kg in total

PROVENANCE: Ex Dr. M.G. Weller collection, Great Britain. These objects were found on Vaciamadrid River Terraces, Manzana area near Madrid, Spain before 1950.

MUSEOGRAPHY: formerly owned by the Museo Arqueologico of Seville. One of the most important museums in Spain, it traces the history of prehistoric man, Iberian and Tartessian (people from Libya), as well as the Phoenicians, Greeks, Carthaginians and Romans.

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
