A WATCHTOWER CHINE - HAN DYNASTY (206 BC-220 AD)

MATERIAL AND TECHNIQUE: This model of architecture has been built in terra-cotta and covered with a glaze containing plumber which creates this colour is obtained thanks to oxide of copper. It is composed of four different elements moulded and assembled freely. As a consequence of its funerary stay, it has been superficially covered with a very thin deposit of calcar with gives this beautiful iridescent silver look to that piece. The basis is composed of a circular basin with flat rim. The superstructure is piled up on it vertically.

Well preserved, some restorations but no lacks.

ORIGIN: Old China. These towers were used in strategic areas, the last floor being the best place to be for observers. The platform underneath with its corbelled balcony was used for a defensive purpose, and archers were posted at the corners. On the basis, a symbolical bestiary of water is represented with ducks, frogs and fishes. These towers have a very strong emblematic significance, which will be used later with the creation of pagodas.
